Executive Director's Report

Over the past year, global events continued to detract Society's energy away from developing a sustainable and just society.

Provincially, cuts to environmental programs and services continued to hinder progress and by the year-end those cuts were already beginning to take their toll.

Unfortunately the immediate future does not luck much more promising, finding support for the environment will most likely continue to worsen before it improves.

Although 2002 did not bring much in the way of good news, globally or provincially, there was a positive side to all this dreary news. Many people are questioning the direction we, as a society, are heading – and they are starting to speak out.

It is getting harder for people to deny the real connection of their actions to the impact they are having on their environment. Still, much is needed in the way of educating people so that they fully comprehend these connections.

The Rivershed Society of British Columbia also experienced similar turmoil in 2002. Cameron Lipp, our dedicated Program Coordinator, died suddenly when his heart gave out while playing hockey one evening in November.

The day before his death, Cameron and I were out paddling on Harrison Lake with a group of young leaders – it was a brilliant sunny day – and Cameron and I joked, he at the helm of the large 34' foot canoe, how grand life can be.

Also, in November, I was elected to Council for the City of Coquitlam, which will also have an impact on the Society's operations in the coming year.

However, given this turmoil, I am still very confident that things will begin to sort themselves out. The RSBC has taken on some interesting initiatives and is continuing to build momentum as a strong service provider within the Fraser River Basin.

Thanks to the work of a dedicated Board of Directors, hard-working committee members and volunteers we continue to make progress toward sustainability within the basin.

In spite of this turbulence, last year proved to be a very successful year and 2003 is looking even better.

On a final note, we will all miss the laughter, quick wit and dedication of Cameron – but I believe his spirit will live on in our work.

A Year In Review ...

2002, year two of our ten-year Healthy Riversheds Strategy, was our strongest year to date. We have firmly established ourselves as a capable education, stewardship and sustainability service provider within the Fraser River Basin.

Capacity Building - Strengthening the Network

- 2nd Annual Riversheds Forum 33 Fraser River Basin stewards once again gathered at the Hills Guest Ranch in 108 Mile House to share rivershed stories, learn about issues and strategize regional initiatives.
- A \$3,500 *Healthy Riversheds Fund* grant went to the Fraser Headwaters Alliance to support their conservation and stewardship work.

Communications & Outreach – *Getting the Word Out*

- **B.C. Rivers Day Music Festival** Over 2,500 people attended this year's festival on the banks of the Fraser and Nechako Rivers.
- 6th Annual Spirit of the Salmon Feast was held at Coquitlam's Pinetree Community Centre on the Thanks Giving weekend.
- We continued with our *media coverage* this year, including articles written by Sustainable Living Leadership Program graduates.

Conservation & Stewardship - Caring for Riversheds

• *Coquitlam Rivershed eco-Footprint Project* – We hired a student to determine the ecological footprint of Coquitlam Rivershed residents. This project received favourable local newspaper coverage.

Public Education - Understanding Sustainability

- *ECO (Environmental Career Options) Works Program* entered its second year and continued to be well-received by teachers and students. 30 workshops were given to more than 1,000 participants at 20 schools in 16 B.C. communities.
- **Paddle Leadership Program** was another success! Over 140 student leaders paddled the Lower Fraser River in two sessions, which came together at New Westminster's Fraser River Discovery Centre to go through a series of stewardship activities on the Friday before B.C. Rivers Day.
- *Rivershed Education Program* 43 presentations were made to 2,844 people in 21 B.C. communities, with the highlight being to group of elders at the Inn at the Quay, part of their Fraser River Bus Tour.
- **Sustainable Living Leadership Program** 7 students, 2 Facilitators, 29 Community Resource Specialists and numerous Fraser River communities participated in the first ever SLLP.



2002 Major Accomplishments

Programs

- 33 Fraser River Basin stewards attended our 2nd Annual *Riversheds Forum* in 108 Mile Ranch.
- 148 student leaders took part in this year's *Paddle Leadership Program* paddling the Lower Fraser
- 30 ECO Workshops were given to more than 1,000 people.
- 43 *Rivershed Education* presentations were given to 2,840 people.
- Initiated the Coquitlam Rivershed eco-Footprint Project.
- Over 2,500 people attended our *B.C. Rivers Day Music Festival* in Prince George.
- 70 people attended our 6th Annual *Spirit of the Salmon Feast* in Coquitlam.
- 7 young leaders graduated from our first ever *Sustainable Living Leadership Program* they traveled 1,200 km down the Fraser River.
- Issued a *Healthy Riversheds Grant* to the Fraser Headwaters Alliance.

Governance

- Expanded work on Board Development, Communications and Development, Executive and Special Events *Board Committees*.
- Revised the *Healthy Riversheds Strategy* our ten-year Fraser River Basin Conservation & Stewardship Plan.

Administration

• Sent out a *funding appeal* to over 500 people, eliciting a good response.

Spirit of the Salmon Feast – October 2002

The 5th Annual Spirit of the Salmon Feast was held in October 2002 at the Pinetree Community Centre. Salmon was donated by the Kwikwetlem First Nation, and food preparation and logistics were assisted by the staff at Pinetree. The event M/C was Janis Olsen, Chair of the Special Events Committee and RSBC Board Member.

Cameron Lipp, RSBC Program Coordinator and his daughter provided guests with a synopsis of RSBC's programs and workshops for 2002 including the Paddle Leadership Program (PLP) held in September 2002. A student, who participated in the PLP, gave a short but well-received presentation on her experience paddling with RSBC along the Fraser River.

The Committee has recommended the Feast be postponed for 2003, so we can re-focus our roles and re-strategize in terms of optimum delivery of this and other RSBC events. With the loss of Cameron Lipp in November 2002 and a need to re-focus the Special Events Committee, a board retreat for 2003 to discuss these items is recommended.

Pre-AGM Board Recruitment Event – May 2003

RSBC held its first annual wine and gourmet food event at the Fraser River Discovery Centre on May 13th, 2003. The catered event was complements of Board Member, Greg Smith, through Lilliget Catering. The event introduced invited guests to RSBC's mission, goals and programs through an evening of discussion, short video clip, and overhead presentation by Executive Director, Finbarr Donnelly.
