Rivershed attended the 2024 BC Salmon Recovery Conference hosted by Pacific Salmon Foundation in Vancouver earlier this month, connecting with experts and leaders dedicated to salmon conservation. This was a valuable opportunity to share ideas, strengthen collaborations, and advance collective efforts to protect wild salmon and their habitats.

Rivershed is in the early planning stages of an exciting new paddle program, Watershed Workforce, launching in the summer of 2025.
