June 1 is Wild Salmon Day, and our friends at **the Pacific Salmon Foundation** and the **First Nations Fisheries Council** are inviting individuals and organizations to raise the flag for wild salmon and speak up for their future. The <u>Wild</u> <u>Salmon Day</u> website has lots of ways you can take part, from <u>raising the flag</u> on social media to signing the <u>Wild Salmon Declaration</u> and sharing messages using their ready-made <u>toolkit</u>. Wild salmon are essential to a healthy Fraser and protecting them is key to Watershed CPR (Connect. Protect. Restore.). Be sure to check it out and add your voice to this important campaign.

Witnessing dormant winter plants become new growth in the Spring. As the watershed wakes up with first buds of the year amidst snow cover, the cycle begins— bloom to berry, to ripe fruit, and then seed dispersal. Join us in restoring connection back into the lands and waters of the Fraser Watershed!

Foodlands program staff, in collaboration with local community knowledge holders, are preparing for a season of planting at restoration sites across the watershed, including sce:4xwəyəm, Bell Slough, and Stoney Creek–Nechako. Collaborators will be planting native species like wild rose, salmonberry and red elderberry along with cottonwood, red osier dogwood and willow species—plants that support water, salmon, wildlife, and the ecosystems we all depend on. We're raising funds to purchase native plants and restoration supplies, and we're asking you to consider making a donation to support this important work.


